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IT'S ALL ABOUT THE PREP

Is your child preparing for SATs, 11+ Exams or GCSEs?

reparing a child for exams is a well-rounded process that involves not just academic study but also emotional support, time management and a healthy lifestyle. The following is a guide on how to get your child exam-ready:

Understanding the Curriculum.

Ensure your child (and you) understand what is going to be covered in the exam. This means reviewing the curriculum and marking key subjects or topics that require more attention. Most GCSE students do not know their exam board!

Tuition Support.

If your child is struggling with certain subjects, tuition can offer tailored support. Rarely will children improve passively so plan ahead. Early intervention and support can make a big difference. Ensure your tutor is a qualified teacher and DBS checked.

Create a Study Plan and break it down.

Create a study schedule with your child that breaks down the syllabus into manageable chunks. Include time for tuition sessions, self-study, and rest.
Consistency is the key to success. Ensure that your child has a regular study routine. Even if it is just an hour of focused study every day, consistency helps. Mix the subjects to avoid burnout. Vary the subjects your child works on each day. This will help keep them engaged and reduce stress.

Encourage Active Learning.

Encourage your child to discuss the material with you, their school teacher or their tutor. Explaining concepts out loud often reinforces understanding. Visual tools like mind maps, coloured revision notes or flashcards help your child remember important points and make revision more interactive. Remember, making revision notes is a technique in itself. They have to be colourful, in short form and not packed together.

Simulate exam conditions.

Regularly test your child under timed conditions to replicate the exam environment. This will help with time management during the real exam.

Healthy Study Environment.

Create a quiet, organised study space. A distractionfree environment can help your child focus better. Minimise distractions and limit access to devices that might distract them (social media, games, etc.) during study hours. This will help maintain concentration.

Emotional and Psychological Support.

Encourage your child with positive reinforcement. Focus on their efforts and progress rather than just the outcome. It is normal to feel anxious about exams. Help your child manage stress by staying positive, having a proper sleep routine and having regular but light physical activities.

Praise efforts, not just results. Emphasise the importance of effort and learning rather than just the grades. This encourages a growth mindset. The grades will come!

Health and Well-being.

A balanced diet is very important. A well-nourished body supports brain function. Ensure your child has a balanced diet with fruits, vegetables and healthy snacks to maintain energy levels. Adequate sleep is essential for concentration and memory. Ensure your child has a regular sleep routine, especially as exams approach. Regular physical activity reduces stress and boosts mood, so encourage your child to take short breaks to stretch, walk or exercise.

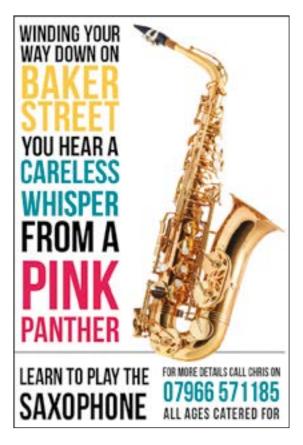

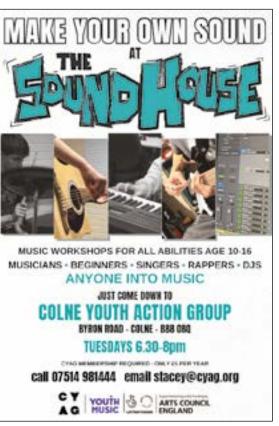

STUFF YOU'LL NEED

- 24 (or 25) clean cardboard toilet rolls
- Large piece of cardboard (a cereal box works) for the backing
- Green paper or green paint + brushes (brown for the 'trunk' is nice)
- PVA glue or glue stick (grown-ups can use a glue gun if you want it extra strong)
- Safety scissors (Ask an adult for help)
- Tissue paper or thin wrapping paper (for 'doors')
- Number stickers or a marker (1–24 or 1–25)
- Small treats/notes (stickers, jokes, sweets, tiny toys, acts of kindness)
- Extras to decorate: star cut-out, ribbon, sequins, stickers, washi tape

HOW TO MAKE IT

Paint or Wrap the Rolls (optional)

Paint rolls green (and 2–3 rolls brown if you want a trunk). Let them dry.

No paint? Wrap each roll with green paper and tape the seam.

Make the "Doors"

Draw and cut 24–25 circles of tissue/wrapping paper a little bigger than the end of a roll (about 7–8 cm wide). Write numbers 1–24 (or 25) on the circles or add number stickers.

Fill the Rolls

Pop one treat/note into each roll.

Glue or tape a numbered circle over the opening to seal it. (This will be the side kids punch through each day.)

Plan the Shape

On your cardboard backing, sketch a simple triangle for the tree

Dry-Fit First

Place the sealed ends all facing out and arrange the rolls on the backing inside your triangle (don't glue yet) until you're happy with the look.

Glue the Rolls

Lift one roll at a time, add glue to the side touching the backing and to the sides touching its neighbours, then press back into place.

Add the Trunk and Star

Glue 2–3 brown rolls at the bottom for the trunk. Cut a star from yellow card and stick it at the top.



Decorate the Tree

Add ribbon 'garlands,' stickers, sequins, or paper 'baubles' between the numbers. You can also wrap the backing in green paper for a neat finish.

Hang or Stand

To hang: glue a ribbon loop to the back.
To stand: cut the backing a little bigger than the tree for a sturdy base.

Count Down!

Each day, find the number, push through the paper door, and enjoy the surprise inside.

HINTS AND TIPS

Kids use safety scissors and PVA; an adult should handle any hot glue. If rolls are wobbly while drying, use a few bits of masking tape to hold them in place; peel off later. No sweets? Fill with kindness challenges, jokes, or activity coupons.

These easy, tasty treats will fill your home with warmth, sweetness and festive cheer.

GINGERBREAD SYRUP

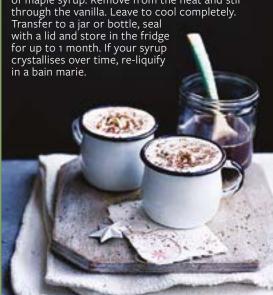
Makes 300ml | Prep: 10 mins, plus cooling Cook time: 20–25 mins

INGREDIENTS

- 300g granulated sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground ginger
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Put 500ml of water in a large, heavy-based saucepan with the sugar, spices and salt and bring to the boil. Watch carefully or the mixture may overflow.

Reduce to a rolling simmer and cook for 15–20 minutes uncovered, or until the consistency of maple syrup. Remove from the heat and stir through the vanilla. Leave to cool completely. Transfer to a jar or bottle, seal





KEINDEER * SHOKTBREAD

Makes 8 | Prep time: 20 mins Cook time: 15 mins

e: 15 mins

INGREDIENTS

- 200g unsalted butter, softened
- 100g caster sugar
- 300g plain flour
- ½ teaspoon vanilla extract
- pinch of salt
- 16 Opies Cocktail Cherries
- 16 mini pretzels
- 32 candy eyes or mini mhocolate chips
- 50g thick Icing

METHOD

Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan) and line a baking tray with parchment paper. In a large mixing bowl, cream together the softened unsalted butter and caster sugar until light and fluffy.

Add the plain flour, vanilla extract and pinch of salt to the bowl. Mix until the ingredients come together to form a dough. Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface to a thickness of about ½cm, use a large dinner plate as a template to cut a large circle and place on a lined baking sheet

Place the baking tray in the preheated oven and bake for 12-15 minutes, or until they are lightly golden brown around the edges. Once baked, remove from the oven and cool on the baking tray for a few minutes and cut into wedges, before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely. Use icing to glue one a cocktail cherry at the end of each cookie to represent the reindeer's nose.



GINGERBREAD * TRAYBAKE CAKE

Makes one 20cm x 30cm traybake \mid Prep time: 15 mins Cook time: 30 mins

INGREDIENTS

- 200g unsalted butter + 40g for icing
- 150g light brown sugar
- 4 tbsp black treacle
- 2 eggs
- 300g self raising flour
- 1 tbsp ground ginger
- 150ml milk
- 75g cream cheese
- 200g icing sugar
- crushed gingerbread men, to decorate

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 160°C (fan). In the mixing bowl, cream together the butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add in the treacle and eggs, followed by the flour, ginger and milk, mixing after each addition until a thick, smooth batter is formed. Pour the batter into the prepared tin and bake for 25-30 minutes until risen and springy to the touch. Allow to cool completely. Make the icing by combining the 40g butter, cream cheese and icing sugar until no lumps remain. Using a palette knife or the back of a spoon, spread evenly on top of the ginger sponge and sprinkle with crushed gingerbread men.

MINCE PIE + TURNOVERS

Makes 8-10 portions | Prep time: 30 mins Cook time: 25 mins

INGREDIENTS

- 400g plain flour
- 200g unsalted butter
- 4 tbsp cold water
- ½ tsp mixed spice (optional)
- Jar of mincemeat
- 1 egg for egg wash
- granulated sugar for sprinkling
- cream

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 180°C (fan). In the large mixing bowl, rub together the plain flour, mixed spice and butter with your fingertips until a breadcrumb consistency is achieved. Add in the water and bring together to form a dough.

Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and roll it out into as large a rectangle as possible, keeping a thickness of about 3-4mm. Cut the dough into as many squares as possible (approx 10cm x 10cm), then reroll the trimmings until you have 8/10 squares. Place a heaped tablespoon of mincemeat into the centre of each square, use your finger to brush the edge of the pastry squares with your beaten egg then fold one corner over to the opposite to form a triangle. Crimp the edges with a fork and place on the baking tray. Brush each turnover with your egg wash, cut a small vent in the top of each one and sprinkle with granulated sugar before placing in the oven for 20-25 minutes until golden brown. Serve warm with cream.

Freeze bread, leftovers, herbs, even milk! Think of it as a pause button for food. Just label and date things - no one wants 'mystery stew' night.

3. Rotate Your Stock

When unpacking groceries, move the old stuff to the front and new to the back. Simple, but it works supermarkets swear by it!

4. Have a 'Use Me First' Box

Stick a basket in the fridge for food that's nearly out of date. It's a visual reminder - and a great source of easy snacks.

5. Use Every **Last Drop**

Add water to nearlyempty sauce bottles and shake - perfect for pasta sauce or stew bases. A splash of frugality never hurt anyone!



6. Keep It Cool (But Not Arctic)

Set your fridge to about 4°C. Too warm and food spoils; too cold and your salad freezes solid. Milk and meat go on the bottom shelf where it's coldest.

7. Freeze fruit

Don't bin overripe bananas or soft berries — chop and freeze them in reusable bags or containers. Perfect for quick smoothies, baking, or adding a fruity boost to breakfast.

8. Serve Smaller Portions

Kids' eyes are often bigger than their bellies. Dish up smaller portions - they can always ask for seconds. Less waste, fewer tears at the table.

9. Get Creative with Scraps

Carrot tops? Make pesto. Broccoli stalks? Chuck them in soup. Stale bread? Breadcrumbs or pudding.

10. Shop Smart, **Not Hungry**

Never shop on an empty stomach you'll buy half the shop! Make a list and stick to it.

Nothing wasted, everything tasty.

11. Love Your Leftovers

Turn Sunday roast into Monday pie, Tuesday soup or Wednesday sarnies. A little creativity goes a long way.



13. Batch Cook and Freeze

Cook big portions of chilli, bolognese, or soup, then freeze in family-sized tubs. Perfect for busy nights and stops you reaching for takeaway menus.

14. Store Food **Properly**

Potatoes like a cool, dark spot (not the fridge). Bananas, tomatoes, and onions prefer room temp. A little storage know-how saves a lot of waste.

15. Compost the Rest

For the peelings, scraps and bits you truly can't save compost them. The kids will love watching waste turn into something useful for the garden.



Being frugal isn't about going without -

10 Gentle Ways to Support Them

When a child experiences loss, they don't just need answers — they need love, patience, and understanding. These ten gentle ideas will help you comfort and support a grieving child while giving them space to heal at their own pace.

1. Use simple, honest words

When someone dies, it's tempting to soften the language—saying someone "passed on" or "went to sleep." But young children often take words literally, and phrases like these can be confusing or even frightening. If a pet is said to have "gone to sleep," a child might begin to fear bedtime.

Paul Parsons, Head of Clinical at Winston's Wish explains: "It can be really tricky as adults to talk openly and honestly when a child is bereaved but it's essential that we use age-appropriate but clear language. Don't shy away from talking about it or worry that you're going to make it worse.

"Younger children may be very confused about what is happening or they may have fears or worries that they don't know how to communicate to you. Offering a space to talk to them regularly will help them to be able to share what they are feeling."

Being honest helps children understand what's really happened, without leaving them to fill in the blanks with their imagination.

2. Keep it simple

Children process things differently depending on their age and stage of development. Too much detail can feel overwhelming. Start with the basics: 'Grandma died. That means her body stopped working and we won't see her anymore.' Let your child guide the conversation by asking questions. This way, they can take in information at their own pace, rather than being overwhelmed all at once.

3. Allow them to grieve in their own way

We all grieve differently. Some adults stay busy, others need quiet time. Children are no different. One minute they may be crying, the next they're laughing and running around the garden. It doesn't mean they don't care - it just means their minds and hearts process grief in bursts. Give them permission to feel whatever comes up. Let them know it's okay to feel angry, sad, or confused. Offer comfort with hugs, patience, and gentle reassurance.

4. Encourage play and creativity

Not every child wants, or is able, to talk about their feelings directly. Play can be a safe way for them to express what's going on inside.

You might suggest drawing a picture of the person who died, writing a letter to them, creating a memory box, or even acting things out with toys. Children make sense of the world through play. When words feel too big, creativity can provide a softer outlet for grief.

5. Keep routines where possible

Loss can make the world feel unstable. That's why routines are so important. Bedtimes, school runs, and mealtimes may seem small, but they provide a sense of security. Of course, flexibility is necessary—some days will be harder than others—but keeping familiar rhythms helps children know that life, though changed, still has structure.



"Trying to keep to a routine as much as possible can be really helpful," Paul says. "The death of a parent can turn a child's life upside down, but they can often find comfort in routine and structure. Try to maintain a sense of normalcy by sticking to regular routines that they are used to and over time develop new normal.

6. Show your own emotions

Many adults worry about crying in front of children, fearing it will scare them. But seeing you shed tears, or hearing you say "I miss Grandma too," can actually reassure them. It shows that grief is natural and that feelings are safe to share. Children learn from what we model. If they see you allowing yourself to feel, they'll learn it's okay for them to do the same.

7. Share memories and create rituals

Talking about the person who died doesn't make things worse—it helps keep their memory alive. You might bring out a photo album when your child mentions them, share funny stories at dinner, or light a candle on birthdays and anniversaries.

These rituals reassure children that while someone is gone physically, the love and memories remain. It gives them something to hold onto.

8. Answer questions

Children often ask the same question over and over: "Where is Grandad?" or "When is the dog coming back?" This repetition doesn't mean you explained it poorly—it's simply their way of making sense of something so big. Older children may want more detail but might not know how to ask. You could gently check: "Do you want me to tell you about what happened?" Let them set the pace, and remind them they can come back with questions whenever they need.

9. Don't overlook the loss of pets

For many children, the death of a pet is their first encounter with grief. To them, the loss can feel just as painful as losing a person. Holding a small farewell ceremony, drawing pictures, or talking about happy memories can help them honour the bond. It also shows them that their grief matters.

10. Seek extra support if needed

Most children, with time and support, will find their own way through grief. But if you notice ongoing withdrawal, nightmares, aggression, overwhelming guilt, or changes in sleep and appetite, it may be a sign they need extra help. Counsellors, teachers, or grief specialists can provide a safe space for children to share feelings they might not express at home.

Grief is not about 'getting over it.' It's about learning to live with the loss while carrying forward the love and memories. As adults, we can't take away children's sadness, but we can walk alongside them - listening, comforting, and reminding them they're not alone.

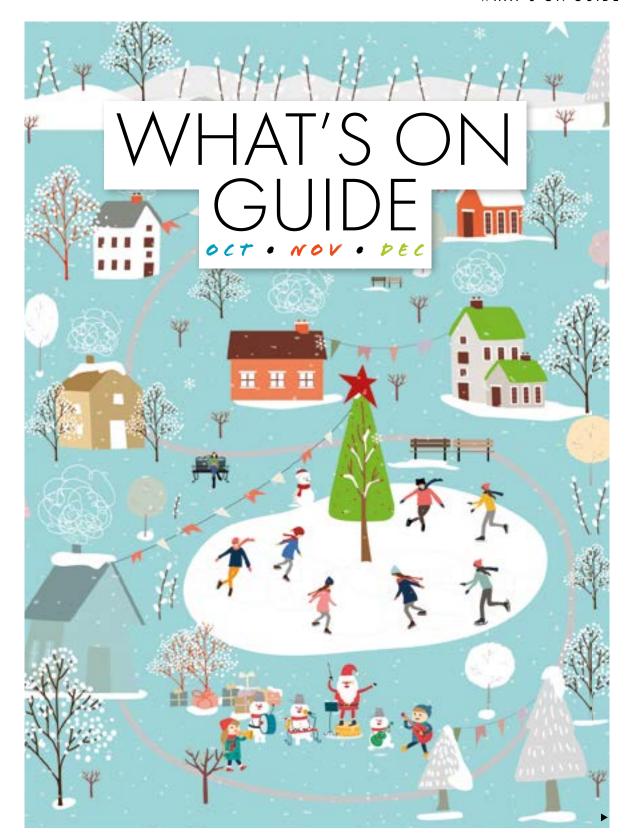
